Every Friday, you attend the Varsity Club meetings as their president, this same senior, discusses the importance of athletes' mental health. 
yet.

The most common event held by Morgan's Message is a #9for9, which is when you complete 9 of any activity (9 jumping jacks, 9 mile walk, 9 cartwheels,

etc.) These #9for9s can be held anytime throughout the year. The biggest one, run by the organization itself which is headed in Virginia, is on July 11th, the day Morgan passed.

"It's cool being able to lead a club (Varsity Club) full of athletes and do work within our community. Morgan's Message is another way to reach those people," she said

When not on the soccer field or leading a club meeting, Ella can be found at the gym or working at Rush Bowls, the new acai bowl and smoothie place in downtown Phoenixville. At home, Ella spends time with her mom and dad, twin brother Greyson, sister Sara, and dogs Penny and Jovie. In the future, Ella plans on heading into the sports medicine field to help people rehabilitate from injuries.

In the reality TV show, MUAs (makeup artists) are given tasks to complete in an allotted amount of time. MUA's are given a description of the new look and are required to complete the challenge with their brief prior preparation of ideas on hand. Unfortunately, the lowest two scoring MUAs must go head-to-head in a 'Face Off,' meaning two makeup artists go up

against each other in a difficult challenge, normally focusing on one section of the face. If the selected individuals do not accede to the judges expectations, they are given consequences, usually resulting in elimination. The tough feedback that Val and Dom give consist of critiques such as 'not symmetrical,' 'not vibrant enough,' or 'that their look is just downright bad!' With limited time and harsh critiques, applying makeup becomes incredibly nerve-wracking to say the least.

One thing that I enjoy about this show is the MUAs support and kindness to each other. All contestants are very genuine when competing against each other. Some even help each other out when they may be running behind in their task. It gives the audience a sense of comfort to see these talented individuals look out for each other.

"Barbie": A look at life in the Dreamhouse

Barbies. Everyone knows what they are, and most children who grew up in the 1960s and beyond have played with them at one point in their lives. Who would have guessed this innocent-seeming doll and her friends would one day cash out at the box office, generating 1.3 billion dollars in global sales?

The 'Barbie' movie begins with multiple actors who represent past versions of the Mattel Barbie, living blithely in Barbie-Land. Without a care in the world, the movie shows all the Barbies going about their day in a perfectly pink manner. 'Perfect Barbie', or main character Barbie (Margot Robbie), is seen heading to the beach to meet with other Barbies, and of course, the Kens. As a juxtaposition to the real world, the Patriarchy does not exist in BarbieLand. The Barbies rule BarbieLand and the Kens only have one job; 'beach'. When Barbie starts to have forbidden thoughts about death and her morning routine gets out-of whack, she goes to see Weird Barbie (Kate McKinnon). Weird Barbie is one of those Barbies that was played with too hard, had missing strands of hair, and was always left naked. When Barbie, and Ken, who sneaks along for the car ride, enter the real world, Barbie finds who she believes to be her person, Sasha (Ariana Greenblatt), a self-conscious high schooler. Sasha yells at Barbie and calls her an assortment of names, such as 'fascist'. Barbie is struck by feelings of self-doubt as she realizes the real world is nothing like Barbie-Land,

while Ken feels empowered because he is starting to see the power men possess in this world. When Barbie, Sasha, and Gloria (Sasha's mom) return back to Barbie-Land, they realize it has become Kendom Land- where Patriarchy is a very real concept. The Barbies have become brainwashed and the infamous Dreamhouse has become "Ken's Mojo Dojo Casa House." Sasha, Sasha's mom, Weird Barbie, and of course, Barbie, are able to restore BarbieLand, however Barbie feels like something is missing. She hopes to become human, and the original creator of Barbie, Ruth Handler (Rhea Pearlmen), enters the movie and tells Barbie she never needed permission. Barbie transforms, and the movie ends, conveying a feeling of female empowerment.

While the movie was advertised to most age groups (everyone older than 13), it was specifically created for your parents, and even grandparents, who are now able to fully experience their childhood toy

again in a different light. For example, Gloria, Sasha's mom in the film and Barbie's "person," who had not touched a Barbie in decades, was pleasantly reunited with her old childhood best friend. This is why you may have noticed Barbies in BarbieLand that you did not recognize, like 2003 Lawyer Barbie (Sharon Rooney), Allan (Michael Cera), and 1963 Barbie, Midge (Emerald Fennell), who was pulled from shelves in 2003.

When I watched the movie for the first time, I was not expecting all the political and social references the movie makes. I think a lot of people, including myself, expected the movie to be a light-hearted comedy. While there are certainly some funny performances in it, I now take the movie as a reflection on the inequality in our society, as well as a way to ridicule the unattainable beauty standards society holds for women

It is clear Mattel has realized the problematic standards they've set with their line of 'perfect' Barbies, and in the past years have begun creating new Barbies that represent more and more of our diverse population. While some say the movie is too political, I believe they are simply not open to the inclusion and change that is needed in our world today.

Humorous moments and very catchy songs, like "I'm Just Ken" help to bring the right of comedy to this movie, while also bringing social awareness to all age groups. Although our country is no BarbieLand, movies like "Barbie" help bring attention and awareness to issues in our society, such as sexism, that must be changed or prevented in hopes to better our world.

Ice Spice, an up-and-coming rapper from the Bronx, uses catchy and amusing lyrics within each of her songs to capture the attention of listeners around the world. By combining a fascinating flow with memorable wordplay, this rising 23-year-old rapper has been climbing the Billboard charts since 2021 with the success of songs like "Deli," "Princess Diana," and "Bikini Bottom."

Isis Naija Gaston, professionally known as Ice Spice, began her musical career while balancing an education at Purchase College. As she was studying communications and playing volleyball, Gaston released "Bully Freestyle" in March of 2021. This debut song was produced by RiotUSA, another musician attending the same college as Ice Spice. The pair met through a mutual friend, unaware that this partnership would soon lead to 41.7 million monthly listeners and over two billion views on YouTube!

The stage name "Ice Spice" (which is not affiliated with the Spice Girls) arose when Gaston was creating a name for her Instagram account. Her first name is Isis, where the "Ice" part of "Ice Spice" comes from. After thinking of words that rhyme with ice, she chose the word spice, leading to the invention of her captivating stage name. The name "Ice Spice" is also fitting because she loves spicy food, especially hot sauce. Gaston's vivid red hair and electrifying personality are fitting additions to her overall presence on stage.

Many of Gaston's songs contain beats and a flow from a genre called "drill music," which originated in Chicago. This musical style is also utilized by rappers like Pop Smoke and King Von to illustrate the reality of their lives and culture. Gaston's experiences with unrequited love, partying, and female empowerment, for example, are emphasized within her debut extended play album, "Like .. ?" This collection of six songs was announced only a few hours prior to its release, yet it gained instant traction with the success of her hit song "Munch (Feelin' U)." Gaining over 39 million plays on Spotify and 50 million views on Youtube, Ice Spice became an overnight sensation.

Although "Munch (Feelin' U)" is the most widely streamed song on Gaston's original album, her motivational nature is captured within the song "In Ha Mood." Gaston's intentions while writing the album "Like .. ?" were to excite and stimulate listeners while providing them with a catchy, upbeat melody. On the song she raps, "She a baddie, she know she a ten / She a baddie wit' her baddie friend." Not only does this song contain memorable lyrics that inspire women to know their worth and be confident, but it also inspired over 700,000 Tiktok users to dance and create videos to her music. With an unforgettable chorus, stating "she in ha mood," Ice Spice advises listeners to chase success and money in life, without worrying about relationships or toxic friends who will drag others down.

While Ice Spice is a fairly new rapper with only thirteen singles, she has dominated the music industry with feats that

few others have accomplished. Her success has paved the way for collaborations with artists like Nicki Minaj, Doja Cat, and Taylor Swift. Perhaps her most memorable performances occurred on Taylor Swift's "Eras Tour" stage, as the duo performed "Karma" for audiences greater than 70,000 per show. Ice Spice's rapid fame, despite the fact that she is only 23 years old, proves how swiftly a talented artist can spice up today's music scene.

"Live at the Paramount": The beginning of the end

Although performed on Halloween of 1991, three years before the dissolution of Nirvana due to the death of Kurt Cobain, "Live at the Paramount" was considered by those attending the concert as, "the beginning of the end" of Nirvana. The album, which was only officially released 20 years after its recording, became available to the public in 2011 and followed the massive success of Nirvana's 1991 album, "Nevermind."

The album consists of songs from the two albums that the band had released at couple of covers from other bands includ- Pacific Northwest alongside the band ing "Love Buzz" by Shocking Blue, and "Jesus Doesn't Want Me For A Sunbeam" by The Vaselines.

Despite having agreed to record the live performance, the members of Nirvana (Kurt Cobain, Krist Novoselic, and Dave Grohl), did not agree to it being videotaped. John Silva, co-manager of Nirvana, hired a video crew for \$250,000 to dress in black and secretly videotape the concert with 35 mm cameras to sell for profit against the band's wishes.

Seattle photographer Charles Peterson, credited for his chronicling the rise of grunge in Seattle, believed that the record label Nirvana belonged to, DCG Records, covertly filming the concert was, "The beginning of the end. It was so unfair to their home audience because it stilted the performance. It reeked of money."

The recorded show was the third of the time, as well as their EP "Blew" and a three performances by Nirvana in the

Mudhoney, and the final show of the North American leg of the "Nevermind" tour. It was the largest show the band had played, with an audience of 2,800 people. Tickets were only \$10.

The show began with bassist Novoselic, commenting on the lack of Halloween costumes in the crowd and beginning with a cover of "Jesus Doesn't Want Me For A Sunbeam," which garnered loud cheers from the audience, as did the next three songs "Aneurysm," "Drain You," and "School." They then delve into their fifth song, "Floyd the Barber," about a character from "The Andy Griffith Show" who is visited by a man looking for a shave only to get kidnapped, tortured, and killed by locals, noting how the generation raised in the 1950s have idolized their upbringings. Once they finish performing the song, Novoselic shouts into the mic, "White boy funk sucks!"


A song that was considered by Cobain as "risky" to perform, as there was pressure within the social scene to remain more punk, was a 1989 track off the "Bleach" album, "About a Girl", a song that was written and produced before Grohl joined the band, and inspired by the Beatles. When Cobain was asked what it was about by at-the-time drummer Chad Manning, he simply responded, "it's about a girl."

One of the most notable songs played was an at the time unreleased song "Rape Me," performed during the show's encore, which was a part of the band's final album, "In Utero" that was written by Cobain while "Nevermind" was being mixed.

This show given by Nirvana is one of the clearest and most concise they had ever played. Cobain's phrasing and vocal


performance, although rough and yowling, seems a deliberate choice, Krist's uniting bass playing, and Grohl's relentless and empowered drumming renders the act poignant and exhilarating. The performance is anything but incidental or non committal and feels more intense and remarkable with every individual listen.

This show might've been the beginning of the end for Nirvana, but if you happen to be looking for a similar sound, I'd recommend Hole, Foo Fighters, Jane's Addiction, Scream, and Mudhoney.


tant coaches Dan Wasson and Brian Leister continued to provide great guidance for the team.

Having clinched a wild card playoff berth, fans question what the post season has in store for Philly, and what the team needs to do to make another World Series appearance. How did they get here? What are some main concerns? With a final record of 90-72, the Phil-

lies will play in the National league wild

card round as the #4 seed, and will host The Marlins in a best of three game series. In a head-to-head matchup against Miami, the Phillies seem like the favorite. However, a short series against any team brings up the Phillies' most prominent issue throughout the season, pitching. This concern has been preached by Philly seems like a redundant take, because if every team hits home runs, every team third in home runs behind the Dodgers (#2 seed) and the Braves (#1 seed). After starting off the season not hitting home runs, the final number is impressive, as the Phillies ranked number two in home

fans alike, but doesn't get as much national attention as praise for their hitting, or individual stardom from players such as Bryce Harper or Trea Turner.

On paper, the Phillies have a solid pitching staff. They are third in the National league in ERA, strike outs, and quality starts (just four behind the NL leader). However, the relief pitching has shown to be an issue throughout the midseason. Throughout the 2023 season, the average Phillies relief pitcher who's played at least 25 games had an ERA close to 4.11. These pitching numbers will get you through the season, but won't fly in the playoffs

In the postseason, the key to the Phillies' success will be hitting the ball. It runs over the last 30 days (43). Home runs play a crucial role not just for runs themselves, but keeping a scoring distance similar defense to the Dodgers or Braves. from whoever they may face.

The Phillies' first playoff opponent, the Marlins, snuck into the postseason by dominating low scoring games. In one-run games this season, the Marlins are 33-13. This series could pose an unwelcome threat, especially because the Marlins took the series win during the season (7-6) with four Marlins victories ending in one-run games. The Marlins are last in the NL in runs scored, so if the Phillies' bats stay hot, Philly can hopefully win the series quickly and focus on the series ahead: the Atlanta Braves.

The Braves are certainly a tough team,

finishing the season with 104 wins (14 more than Philadelphia) but that doesnt would win, but it is true. The Phillies rank mean the Phillies' season has to end here. The Phillies pose a real threat to Atlanta, as already proven in last year's playoffs during an upset in the same round, so why not do it again? Philadelphia already has an immediate lineup advantage against the Braves' injured roster.

> The Phillies have a shot at the World Series, but their best chance lies in the National league finals. On the other half of the League bracket, there is no absolute NL finals contender. In a situation where it becomes the Dodgers, the Phillies would have played an additional series compared to the Dodgers who had a bye at the 2 seed. Fatigue may start to set in for pitchers and hitters. Los Angeles has one of the best offenses in the league. Even through the problems, there is no telling what this Phillies team can do.

> In the event a World Series appearance does occur, the Baltimore Orioles are the most likely matchup. Any team from the American League is a lesser opponent than the Dodgers and Braves, who the Phillies would have already played, most likely. Baltimore is lesser in offense, with A World Series with all games happening here at home or right down Route 95 would make for a fun set of games.

Is this the year? Previewing the 76ers 2023-24 season

The 76ers have had a controversial recent history. Between "Trust the Process," the Ben Simmons saga, and not reaching the Eastern Conference finals since 2000, Philly has had a rough stretch. So could this be the year to take the title? I think so, but it will take the best of our best and lots of hard work. The Sixers' current success is a heavily debated subject, with some happy to be good, but most tired of losing in the first and second rounds of the playoffs every year. The hope is that the 2023 team can be different with new coaching, some new players, and some revitalized play from the big man, Joel Embiid. These are the significant factors that will contribute to the 76ers championship hopes.

The biggest move in the Sixers' offseason was bringing in new head coach Nick Nurse. Nurse was the head coach in Toronto for five seasons and finished his tenure there as the winningest coach in Raptors' history, with a .582 winning percentage. He was the 2020 NBA Coach of the Year, and won the NBA championship with the Raptors in 2019. Coach Nurse is known for his defensive-minded schemes and his unique way of containing star players that was a major contributor to the previously mentioned 2019 champion Raptors. Nurse makes his teams hustle and run the floor, which were known past problems in Philadelphia. This change in coaching looks good in a perfect world,

Another big move for the 76ers has been the signing of Kelly Oubre Jr., a wing coming from the Charlotte Hornets. This signing was massive and sudden, with him being officially signed on September 26th, only a little less than a month before the season's beginning. Kelly Oubre Jr. is a talented scorer, putting up 20.3 ppg (points per game) on a solid 44% from the field, and shooting 32 percent behind the arc. Adding a shot-maker like this helps create gravity on the court and take some defensive attention off our stars. Oubre will be a great contributor to the team, whether that is in the starting five or coming off the bench. I personally see him coming into a microwave scorer role, making shots off the bench coming in for Tobias Harris. This role is one the team could very much use, with past issues making shots when perennial MVP candidate Joel Embiid is off the court. Oubre is also a good defender with great length for his position with a 7'3 wingspan. I only see his defense getting better under a coach like Nick Nurse, who is known for his defensive genius.

Of course, you can't talk 76ers without talking about Joel "The Process" Embiid. He is one of the best players in the NBA and the reigning league MVP. Last season he continued to be a dominant scorer, averaging a ridiculous 33 PPG on 54% shooting, but the main takeaway was his progression on defense. Embiid saw a massive development on the defensive end this season, becoming much better at moving his feet and hands to contest

shots at the rim or the mid-range without change this team mindset and make them committing fouls. Embiid draws as much defensive attention as any other player in the league, which can lead to easy buckets for the team. With Joel Embiid on the 76ers, there will always be a chance for them to go to the promised land.

So, do the 76ers have the ingredients to win it all? Yes! I believe this may be the year for them to shock the world, especially in a stacked Eastern Conference. The truth is, the biggest problem the team has is hustling. push themselves, it will be Nick Nurse. Glen Rivers's coaching was downright hard to watch at times. Between his strange rotations and his total denial of accountability, he was just not the right guy for the team. I think Nick Nurse has the perfect mindset for the environment he has come into. I also think the new addition of Kelly Oubre will make this offense flow much better with a shooter

All of the changes in Philadelphia look promising to me, and can hopefully lead to the 76ers reaching the pinnacle as NBA








PAHS ART


















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
